

Impact: John Howard Society of Simcoe & Muskoka

Prior to COVID-19, Barrie Police saw 15-25 failure to appears per week. With COVID-19, these went up to over 100 per week. Having limited access to a telephone or computer poses barriers, and in instances where the disclosure is delivered via email, it is often impossible for the client to secure equipment to print the volumes that are sent. When individuals do not have digital access, they are not appearing as they are supposed to.

Upon failing to appear, a new court date is scheduled, and the individual is often unaware of the new date that was issued, leading to the possibility of further charges. This has all been made far worse because of the pandemic.


Barrie Community Foundation granted ECSF monies for the purchase of technology for staff to support clients, with an aim to reduce Failure to Appear.










\$1,744,000 in grants distributed to fund



Community Needs

"A 22-year-old young lady's mother reached out to MiND-AID for help for her daughter, who was looking to escape being trafficked and wanted help ending her drug addiction. The young lady had been hospitalized after being violently sexually assaulted at age 17, which was followed by severe trauma responses, and debilitating fear and anxiety. She had turned to illegal drugs to numb her psychological pain and became addicted, which led her to the man who would traffic her. At the time I met her, this young lady had not received any trauma counselling and was on a waiting list for drug rehab that would have her waiting for 8 months to a year for care. I was able, through community connections and my awareness of available programs and funding, get this young lady into specialized local trauma counselling immediately as well as qualify her for the highest quality drug rehabilitation available, with price tags of \$1000 and \$20,000 respectively, something she and her family would never be able to afford. I continue to support this young lady on her journey to mental wellness, thanks to funding provided in part by the United Way."

"The Digital Access to Justice program allowed for the development of a unique solution in a time of crisis. Faced with mounting bench warrants and growing lists of individuals who were noted as failing to appear for their court hearing because of a lack of ability to attend remotely, we knew there was a need for a response. It was only because of the generous support of the Government of Canada's Emergency Response Fund and the efforts of United Way Simcoe and Muskoka and the Barrie Community Foundation that we were able to mobilize and bring this program to the community."
