Reaching Home: Rural & Remote Funding

United Way Simcoe Muskoka administers Infrastructure Canada's Reaching Home funding

to rural and remote communities across Ontario. aiming to provide housing and supports for those experiencing homelessness, at imminent risk of homelessness, or living rough. Many rural communities struggle with housing due to limited supply, the higher cost of construction and reduced availability of contractors. poor quality, and lack of transitional and deeply affordable housing options.

Reaching Home is Infrastructure Canada's National Housing Strategy, aimed to prevent homelessness and reduce chronic homelessness nationally by 50% by fiscal year 2027 to 2028.

Supporting a young male who is affected by an acquired brain injury, has trouble regulating his emotions and navigating difficult relationships, has a history of substance miss-use, is unable to maintain employment, and has been struggling with suicidal thoughts for some time. As a result of his struggles and related financial instability, he is insecurely housed in a relative's garage and even struggling to maintain that relationship and shelter. After being connected with a caring sibling, that person was able to assist him in getting connected with a free online therapy service. The crisis line numbers have been programmed into his phone to make contact easier. We have helped him to get connected with the homelessness team, to get on housing waiting lists and the subsidized rent program.

BOARD CHAIR AND CEPO REPORT

This past year has been an exciting one for United Way Simcoe Muskoka.

We provided critical funding and support to 56 charities and not-for-profit organizations.

We provided direct financial support to 1,578 individuals through our Urgent Needs Fund in partnership with 211-Community Connections and the District of Muskoka.

We administered 12,755 Low-Income Energy Assistance Program grants through our call centre, which as a social enterprise, both offsets our overhead administrative costs and contributes directly to our efforts to reduce poverty.

We saw the return to in-person initiatives like "Holiday with a Hero" and our documentary film screenings.

We held our second annual "Coldest Night of the Year" fundraiser in Bradford and partnered with the Blue Mountain Foundation for the "Everest Challenge".

We also engaged our community and developed a new strategic plan to support our community investment commitments. "YOUR Community, YOUR United Way" will see us focus our efforts and resources on the following priorities:

- Building our own internal capacity so that we can meet the needs of the community
- Increasing awareness of United Way Simcoe Muskoka's impact on the communities we serve
- Strengthening communities through strategic funding and partnership opportunities
- Affecting long-term systemic change through advocacy and education.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, we would like to thank all of our donors, partners, staff, and volunteers for supporting our efforts to promote social inclusion and reduce poverty.

TREASURER'S REPORT

United Way Simcoe Muskoka has emerged from the pandemic in a strong financial position, continuing to provide significant contributions to the community through our regional programs and our social enterprise activities. This past fiscal year we invested over \$12 million in funds into the community.

Our finance team members, Carolyn and Kerry, worked diligently to ensure accurate and timely responses both throughout the year and during our annual audit process. Their diligent work allowed for the completion of the audit in time to hold our Annual General Meeting in June. Our external auditors at Grant Thornton issued a clean opinion for this year's audit, remarking on the team's perseverance and professionalism.

The audited financial statements note a downward trend in gifts transferred from other United Ways, offset by a slight increase in local resource development, as well as a significant increase associated with the performance of our social enterprise. We realized a surplus in excess of \$890,000 due in part to the call centre staff's dedication to administering the low-income energy assistance program, and due to the efforts of the resource development and community impact teams. These funds will be distributed in line with our strategic plan helping to meet the needs within our community.

I want to thank our staff members, as well as our many volunteers and strategic partners efforts that contributed to our continued success.
