Professional Pledge of Reconciliation

United Way Simcoe Muskoka is situated on the sacred territorial land of the Anishinaabek. The Anishinaabek include the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Pottawatomi nations, collectively known as the Three Fires Confederacy. The Huron-Wendat and the Haudenosaunee Nations have also walked on this territory over time. We have a responsibility to acknowledge and understand this history and the current experiences of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples. This understanding must inform the work that we do so that we can stop perpetuating the damages of colonization and begin to repair them.

In the spirit of reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples in Canada, including Inuit and Métis, we, United Way Simcoe Muskoka, solemnly pledge to:

1. Commit to honouring #92 of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's calls to action for reconciliation, Business and Reconciliation.

2. Support progressive improvement in our Indigenous, Inuit and Métis relations by encouraging our organization to participate in the Progressive Aboriginal Relations (PAR) program of the Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business.

3. Commit to an in-house community investment strategy that is developed through joint planning with the Indigenous communities involved, including Inuit and Métis, and aligns with the goals and interest of those communities.

4. Ensure and encourage employment and career development opportunities for Indigenous, Inuit and Métis candidates.

5. Create a working environment that is inclusive and welcoming for Indigenous, Inuit and Métis employees and partners.

6. Identify contracting or procurement opportunities for Indigenous, Inuit and Métis businesses and economic development corporations.

7. Commit to generating positive and lasting change in our professional and personal lives.

8. To acknowledge the distinct and unique needs, including health needs, of Indigenous people including Inuit and Métis.

In response, your United Way connected individuals and families in low-income households to over \$5.8M in financial supports and provided over \$5.5M in funding to charities and not-for-profits.

As we look to the future, we are committed to growing our community investment in support of vulnerable populations and the organizations supporting them.

None of this happens without the dedication of our donors, staff, board, volunteers, and community partners, whose commitment we truly value.

In the development of our most recent strategic plan, we heard loud and clear that our community is looking to the United Way to take on a more active role in the areas of advocacy and education. In response, over the past year:

- We continued to advocate for Living Wage as a critical poverty reduction strategy
- We co-hosted our second "ReThink Poverty" event in partnership with the Poverty Reduction Task Group
- We supported advocacy efforts that have resulted in positive changes to Ontario's "Low-Income Energy Assistance Program"
- We expanded our offerings of documentary film screenings through the launch of the "Real2Reel Film Festival" which highlights stories of lived and living experience
- We collaborated with other United Ways across the province in the development of "Bringing Affordable Housing Home: An Action Plan for Housing Stability in Ontario"

As we look to the coming year, we are excited to build on our education and advocacy efforts through the launch of the Resilience Rising podcast in collaboration with our partners at CFS Counselling + Wellbeing.

As we said, these are challenging times, but we have hope for a better tomorrow.

Advocacy & Education

Your United Way is committed to long-term systemic change through Advocacy and Education.

Bringing Affordable Housing Home

United Way Simcoe Muskoka was one of 20 local United Ways in Ontario that joined forces to advocate to the Ontario government for housing stability. This collaborative effort involved convening 23 housing and homelessness service providers in our region, leading to the development of the Bringing Affordable Housing Home report, which was presented at the provincial housing summit and at key community tables.



Ontario Energy Board

United Way Simcoe Muskoka played a key role in the Ontario Energy Board's review of the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program, benefiting low-income families by addressing emergency utility arrears. This effort led to significant program changes advocated by your United Way, including a 28% increase in eligibility income thresholds, a 30% boost in maximum grant amounts, and ensuring no eligible customer is denied aid due to utility providers' funding shortages. Additionally, the income threshold for monthly utility cost assistance rose by 35%.

Real2Reel Film Festival

Supported by RBC Foundation, the Real2Reel Documentary Film Festival is a purpose-driven event addressing complex societal issues such as poverty, youth mental health, human trafficking, and truth and reconciliation. We engaged 400 community members to learn more about these complex social issues.

Advocacy & Education

Rethink Poverty

The Poverty Reduction Task Group for Simcoe County held its second annual "Rethink Poverty" event at The Common Roof in Orillia. Your United Way co-hosted the event in partnership with the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit, Simcoe Muskoka Skillforce, the District of Muskoka and the Town of The Blue Mountains. Rethink Poverty gave attendees a better understanding of how poverty impacts individuals across the region and the strategies being taken to address the issue. 68 government, community and social service representatives took part in analyzing trends and systemic barriers and discussed ideas for action.



Poverty Simulation

Your United Way partnered with Rocket Innovation Studio to create and release a digital poverty simulator, aiming to raise awareness about poverty in our communities. The Living in My Shoes Anti-Poverty Simulator leverages three distinctive online personas and a dynamic array of questions and choices. This immersive experience goes beyond an online 'game'—it's a serious thought experiment designed to foster a profound understanding of local issues in Simcoe County, the Town of Blue Mountains, and the District of Muskoka.

A Living Wage in Simcoe County is \$22.75 and in Muskoka it's \$20.60. Ontario's minimum wage is \$17.20. In Simcoe that's a difference of \$5.55 and in Muskoka \$3.40.




Locally it is estimated that almost 50% of renters are spending more than 30% of their gross household income on shelter, meaning that they are at risk of losing their home.



Working together to address complex community issues

Community Collaborative Projects are 100% funded through local donations

Community collaborative projects are multiyear funded projects that address the gaps in service across Simcoe Muskoka.

2023 marked the end of the first round of our three year collaborative projects, marking a total investment of \$1.8 million. In 2024 United Way Simcoe Muskoka has committed an additional \$2.1 million to a new round of projects that are driving systemic change in food security, mental health, housing, and income stability over the next three years with 30+ partners from the public, private, faith, and non-profit sectors. Including:

Circles Muskoka

Circles Muskoka brought together the community to support individuals and families living in poverty with relationships and resources to thrive.

Furniture Bank

The Furniture Bank diverted used furniture away from landfills to be refurbished and distributed to low-income individuals referred by community agencies.

Poverty Interventions = Health Interventions

Created a cloud-based poverty screening tool and case management system, this project addresses poverty as a vital component of the community's health.

Wiijinokiiwag

Designed a program to bring awareness, action and empowerment for mainstream organizations to create safer environments for the Indigenous Peoples in their care.

YouthCALL Service Link

YouthCALL Service Link expanded a free liveanswer telephone service for vulnerable youth.





Needs That Were Met Through the Urgent Needs Fund



By issuing microgrants to households, the Urgent Needs Fund helps when no existing services meet the demand. The Urgent Needs Fund has been there for our most vulnerable when they have needed it most. These grants do not just meet immediate needs, they provide hope and dignity to the recipients

A 63-year-old homeless man was hospitalized and they lost his dentures. He was placed in a motel in our area and was not able to eat properly for quite some time. UNF and other agencies worked together to replace his dentures. When he was told, he cried and then became excited about deciding the first solid food he would eat once he had his new teeth.




Community Investment vs. Internal Expenses
